The 2021-2022 program year was not just about recovery, but about growth. As we welcomed students back to our programs, we also expanded programming and added new members to our team.

There are more options than ever, with students and tutors meeting in person at libraries, in our office, or continuing to meet remotely. We have sought out additional training and certificates, sharing that knowledge with new and returning volunteers to ensure that we are all prepared to address the needs of current and future students.

We have also expanded our reach, offering the Digital Literacy program in Ontario, Wayne, and Yates Counties through drop-in assistance as well as group computer classes. We are stronger today, combining what we have learned in the past two years with the tested methods we have used over nearly sixty years of service to Rochester.

As always, our work would not be possible without the courage of our students, dedication of our volunteers, and the support of our community.

Literacy Rochester came out of the pandemic full of energy and new ideas! Once the Monroe County libraries opened for our tutors and learners, and the LR office was available to re-start group instruction and testing, we hit the ground running.

And, because of our proven success in digital literacy instruction, we are expanding it into surrounding counties. Our reading, English language, and math tutoring is providing native and non-native speakers with valuable tools to improve their personal and professional lives.

Joseph

Student Spotlight

Joseph remembers the day he arrived in the United States after leaving his family behind in Liberia. It was May 21, 1988.

He spent many years struggling with addiction, arriving in Rochester to enter a rehabilitation center. Since 2000, Joseph has worked multiple retail jobs.

Joseph takes multiple classes at Literacy Rochester, as well as meeting with his tutor, Lisa. Committing a dozen hours per week to learning, he is continually improving.

One-to-One Tutoring

Trained tutors provide instruction for adults, 18 and up, seeking assistance with reading, math (below 9th grade reading level) or English as a Second Language. Through individualized plans, students and tutors meet in a public place in Monroe County. Pre-registration is required before a student is matched with a tutor.

Small Group Instruction

Classes with 5 to 10 students reinforce basic math and reading skills for students seeking access to basic literacy, high school equivalency, or vocational training programs. Pre-registration is required before a student can sign up for small group classes.

English Conversation Groups

Weekly gatherings of 5-10 students and two tutors to practice their English-language speaking skills. These groups provide an opportunity for English as a Second Language students to improve their speaking confidence and meet other adults who are learning English. Topics of conversation include American culture, idioms, daily life situations, and casual spoken English. All adults looking to practice their English-speaking skills are welcome. Registration is not required.



In spring 2022, the Digital Literacy program expanded into Ontario, Wayne, and Yates Counties.

Basic Computer Skills Workshop

For six weeks in March and April 2022, the Digital Literacy program held its first Basic Computer Skills Workshop.

The workshop is designed for adults who are interested in learning how to use a computer and investing in their digital literacy skills. Participants learn how to use a computer, understand a desktop, use the internet, access and use email, learn about online safety and privacy, and apply their skills to real-world tasks.


